## A Message From Pastor

In November, we take time as a nation as well as people of God to give thanks for the blessings God has given us. We give thanks for the material blessings, however many or few of them we have. Perhaps we say a prayer of thanks each night for what we have.

Mostly, we give thanks for people. Perhaps we say a prayer of thanks each night for those people whom we love, and who love us. Some of us count our families in the tens or twenties; others in the fifties or sixties; still others in the hundreds. However large or small our family is, it is right to give our thanks and praise to God for every person in the family.

We may also give thanks for friends, neighbors, and acquaintances. Their

friendship brightens our day, sometimes with just a wave and a smile as we drive by. We might include in our thanksgiving prayers the restaurant servers, grocery store cashiers and even the often unseen folks who deliver our newspapers and mail.

On All Saints Sunday, we name in prayer those who have died in the last year, and we name in our hearts many, many more. We remember those saints – believers – who have gone before us to show us the way to follow Jesus.

Not all saints are dead. Indeed, some of my favorite saints are still living. The saints in my life made sure I knew Jesus loved me. They made sure I went to Confirmation class. They made sure I knew it was OK to ask questions of the Bible, and about what I had been

## Looking to the Future with Hope

Our life stories do not begin at our birth, nor do they end when we die. Our stories reflect our ancestors, perhaps for many generations, our culture, and our faith history. Older folks know that the older we are, the more we can see in the rearview mirror of our lives. If we only look backward, we can lose our way because we also need to keep looking forward.

The book of Hebrews, especially chapters 11 and 12, outline for us the faith story we belong to. The letter looks backward at the history of the people, and forward into the future. Using the refrain, “by faith” the author of Hebrews reminds us that we have a long history of people who stepped out in faith and did sometimes irrational acts. Noah built a boat on dry land; Abraham left home with his wife and family; Moses confronted Pharaoh.

At the time of the writing of Hebrews the people to whom the letter was addressed were experiencing torture and death because of their faith. The author encourages the people of this community of faith to remain faithful and remember the long history of the people of faith to which they belong, and to continue to pass on the faith to the next generations.

As a congregation of mostly – but not only – older adults, we can consider our history, as individuals and as a community of faith. We can remember the history of Hope Lutheran, Citrus Springs. And we can consider how we can intentionally pass on the faith to the next generations.

This year’s VBS was a prime example of how the generations at Hope work together to learn about God’s creation of the world and of us humans. So many folks helped in so many ways: with music, science and crafts, with mentoring a younger person, with bringing friends, with simply showing up to lend support.

Together we raised about \$1200 for a family in serious need. Together we are working to educate the children of this parish. Together, we feed hungry people.

How else can we do ministry that reflects the history of the faith, the history of Hope, and the future of our congregation?

Please come Sunday November 7 after worship to share your stories, your memories, and your hopes for Hope.

## Congregational Advocates

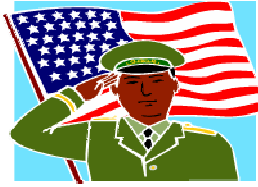

## Library News



It's about time for additional council members, and for each of us to think about volunteering to be on the council and which committee we would like to join as liaison. Our Library has several books that may be of help in making this decision.

The Stewardship Committee: Library books are numbered with the Dewey No. 248.6. In this age there are DVDs, and we have 2. Effective Stewardship. We are called not simply to care for God's creation but to care for it effectively. Also \$6 Man. A man and his daughter strive to survive on \$6. a day. He has lost everything, first his wife to cancer, then his job, bills mount and he loses his home; this DVD is about his struggle to survive on the streets searching for answers that often lead to more questions. A couple books are also available - Stewardship and the Economy of God. What stewardship means for our lives and our world in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. A New Climate for Stewardship. A resource for personal, social, and congregational priorities in the light of God's revelation of the stewardship plan. Creative Stewardship. Dr. Cunningham, the author, evokes the image of a steward who is entrusted with the care of the things of the earth but whose ultimate responsibility is to God.

Worship. The Dewey No. for books about Worship and hymns is 264.

Many books for worship including song

books are available, but worth mentioning is Then Sings my Soul. There are stories behind many of the old hymns. Another one with stories is Famous Hymns with Stories and Pictures. There is a book on The Lord's Supper, one on Baptism, Catechism. A book that came out in paperback in 1970 for a contemporary worship, some of which has been incorporated in our hymnal of today. There is also a rather old book - Confirmation and first Communion.

Another important committee is Evangelism. There are 3 books with the Dewey No. of 254.5. Becoming a Contagious Christian. What is it about verbalizing our faith that scares us? It should be the easiest thing we can do - to share this most important gift with others.

The Continuing Frontier and Evangelism. In as much as mission is the very being of the church, so evangelism is the heart of that mission.

Christian Education as Evangelism. Christian education leads to evangelism and evangelism leads to education.

There are two books with a different Dewey No. but could be classified as Evangelism study, they are 261.1 Final Roar and 269.2 Body Building Guide to Outreach.

### Wednesday Evening Bible Study—Leaders with Spunk

For the last several weeks, we have looked at leadership characteristics of key leaders in the Bible: Abraham and Sarah, Joseph, Moses, Deborah and other women, Jesus, Paul, Mary and other women. Our list is long, because of the variety of leadership styles, and the variety of situations in which they served.

We realized as we studied that biblical leaders were not perfect, but they tried to be guided by God. People didn't always agree with their decisions. God gave them the

abilities they needed to lead the people they were called to lead.

Human leaders today are the same. We are all different, we lead in different ways, and we all try to be guided by God. People don't always agree with the decisions we make. Yet we are called by God to lead anyway.

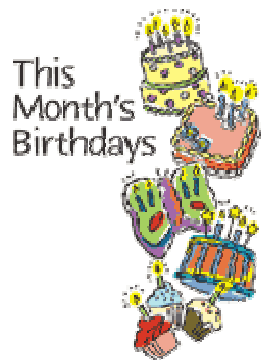
